Its philosophy essence has been replaced in 2016 by a new model focusing on the distribution of uncooked food baskets (except for those who are not able to cook at home, namely the homeless), thus promoting family autonomy. This latest operational programme (POPAMC) is being implemented in articulation with the National General Direction of Health with the objective of promoting healthy eating habits. According to the most recent data, the Program has already supported 125.024 people, representing 47.871 households and 30.245 tonnes of food distributed.

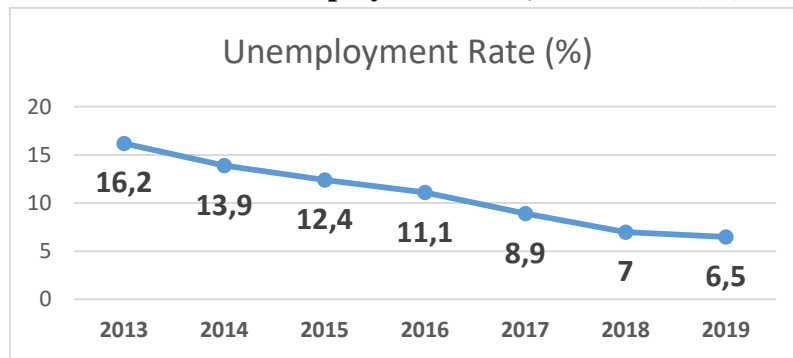

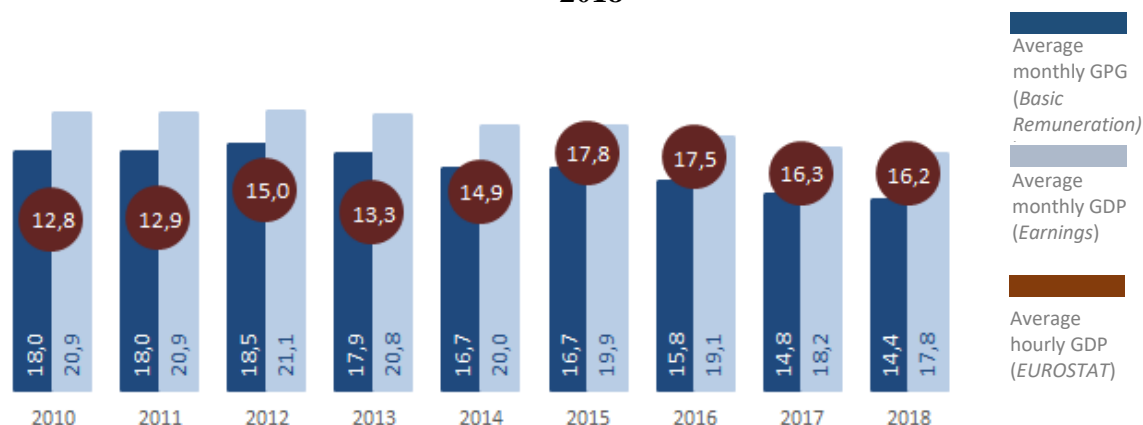

Gender Pay Gap (GPG) is an indicator used to measure wage inequalities between two groups of individuals. In its original formula, average hourly wages are used. As *Quadros de Pessoal* is the source of Barometer, average monthly remuneration is used and, therefore, only full-time employees, with full remuneration during the month of October are considered. There are different ways to measure GPG, but the most common is having average and median wages as references. In the Barometer, the GPG is calculated as $1 - (\text{Women's Average Remuneration} / \text{Men's Average Remuneration})$. There are other supplementary measures to GPG that allow to eliminate any effect that other variables might have on it. These methodologies group women and men into more homogeneous groups (eg. occupation, qualification level, educational attainment, etc.) and then estimate GPG in each of these subgroups. We called adjusted GPG to these measures, being the "adjustment" by a certain factor or several ones.

In either case, if GPG is greater than zero, women receive, on average, less than men. Otherwise, if GPG is less than zero, men receive, on average, less than women. When GPG is equal to or very close to zero it is said that there is equal pay between men and women.

The Barometer is produced by the Cabinet of Strategy and Planning (Gabinete de Estratégia e Planeamento) of the Ministry of Labour, Solidarity and Social Security based on information provided every year by companies and includes detailed data on pay disparities by economic activity sector.

The first edition (June 2019) and the second edition (January 2020) of the Barometer includes sector-level data on the adjusted gender pay gap, providing an innovative source of information on this subject. The Barometer aims at improve statistics, raise awareness and promote a wide-ranging debate on equal pay in the Portuguese society.

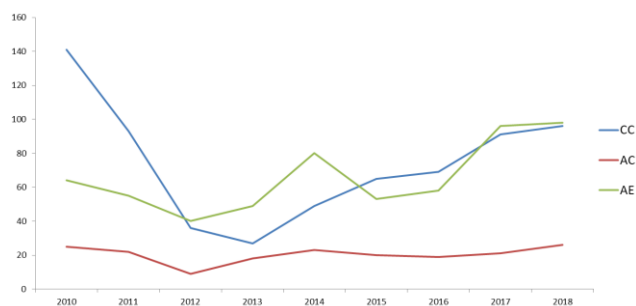

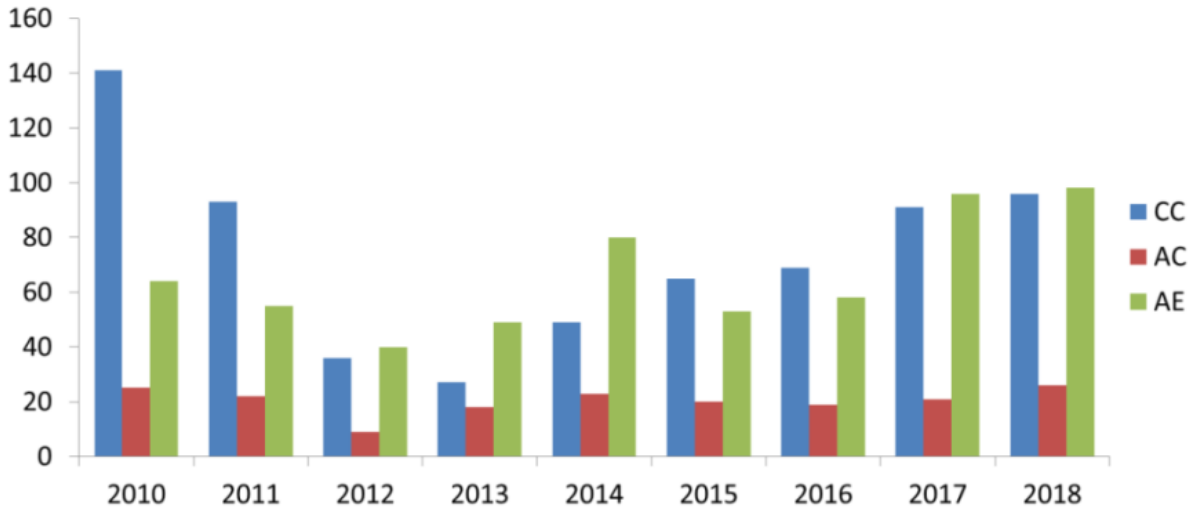

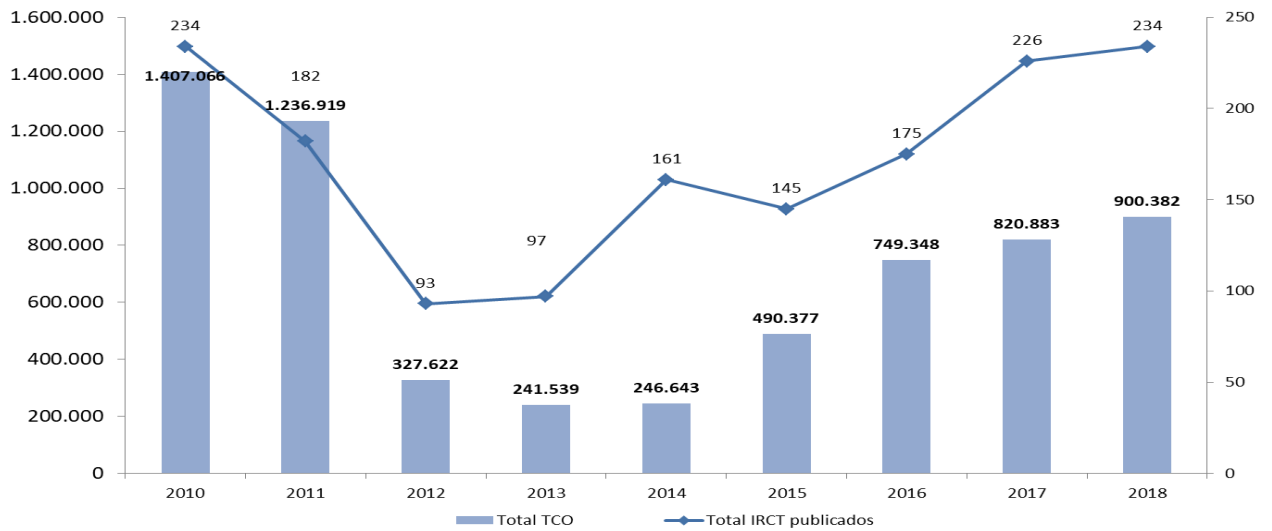
